CDPH Resources to Communicate the Importance of MMR Vaccine

Although measles has been mostly eradicated in the United States, recent outbreaks around the country and world highlight the importance of vaccination. The measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine provides the best protection against disease and serious illness. Strongly recommend MMR to:

- · All babies starting at 12 months of age
- Infants 6 months and older traveling abroad. These babies should still get their 12-month MMR vaccine.
- Children ages 4 to 6 years due for their 2nd dose.

Reminder: Continue Administering RSV Immunization though March 31, 2025.



Please continue recommending and administering the RSV immunization to eligible infants and toddlers until the end of March. RSV immunization is the best way to protect our youngest patients from severe illness and hospitalizations. As a reminder, providers may check the California Immunization Registry (CAIR) or ask the birthing parent to download their digital vaccine record at mydvr.cdph.ca.gov to verify receipt of prenatal RSV vaccine.
