

Preparing for an imminent wildfire



Wildfires can cause immediate injury, loss of life, damage to infrastructure, power outages, poor air quality, limitations to water and gas supplies, and disruption to transport and telecommunication services. Businesses in known wildfire-prone areas should be prepared to take quick and careful action to safeguard their people and properties through robust emergency response, evacuation, and business continuity plans and strategies.

The following checklist provides guidance on actions organizations can consider taking when facing an imminent wildfire. Please note that the following checklist is not all–inclusive and that following this checklist does not guarantee any result, including the outcome of any potential incident or claim.

Monitor and activate			
Follow official communications from local authorities, fire departments, and emergency management agencies.			
Activate your organization's emergency response plan.			
Notify all employees about the wildfire threat and provide clear instructions on evacuation procedures, safety measures, and any changes to work schedules or locations.			
Confirm effective communication channels to keep employees informed throughout the situation.			
Encourage employees to follow safety guidelines issued by local authorities, such as wearing protective masks in smoky conditions and avoiding outdoor activities during poor air quality.			
Identify locations that might be exposed to direct or indirect wildfire damage — including customers' and suppliers' locations.			
Contact local government agencies and emergency services to ensure coordination of response procedures.			
Assemble supplies for the emergency response team, including necessities to mitigate smoke risk.

Identify sources of restoration equipment, supplies, and contractor services from firms located outside the immediate area.			
Obtain estimates on how long the impacts of the wildfire may last.			
Inform tenants of potential evacuation and provide regular updates.			
Initiate safety and security procedures			
Check that existing wildfire measures are in place.			
Secure the premises by closing windows and doors, shutting off utilities if necessary, and removing any flammable materials from the immediate vicinity of the building.			
Store or relocate valuable equipment, machinery, and inventory.			
Start installing any temporary wildfire protection materials.			
Evacuate and relocate tenants if required.			
Protect and mitigate			
Confirm the effectiveness of your "defensible space" — an area around your property that is clear of any combustible objects, including dry brush, grass, and fuels.			
Adjust your response strategies across the organization until authorities say it is safe to return.
